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Access and Conservation News

Angel Bay

The landowners (Mostyn Estates) have approached the BMC requesting that climbers (boulderers) take note that breeding seals occasionally use Angel Bay. If seals are present, ensure that no dogs are taken to the beach, that you do not get between seals and their pups and ideally keep 100m away from the seals. Seal pupping time is normally late August through until October while seals will also "haul-out" for molting in January and February time.

Great Orme

Following the release of the "Fresh Meat" video on Vimeo, documenting some of the new developments on North Wales limestone, conservation organisations raised some serious concerns regarding the cleaning and preparation of new routes on the Ormes. All of the crags on the Ormes have the highest level of legal protection in terms of conservation as well as the issues surrounding liability and public safety for the routes above the Marine Drive.

Some of the most protected and rarest plants found on limestone in the UK grow on these cliffs and these sites are actively

monitored and surveyed annually by conservation bodies.

While most climbing activities on the Ormes are welcomed by the land managers and conservation organisations, there are some locations and crags that are deemed not appropriate for climbing due to the risk that climbers could damage the protected flora on those sites.

One such area is the line of cliffs both above and below the Marine Drive above West Shore. Some nationally rare and scare plants are located on these cliffs and both National Resources Wales (NRW) and Conwy Council have requested that climbers do not climb on these cliffs, which include the recently developed Craig Heulog which is now banned.

Staff from NRW and Conwy Council are hoping to come to the next BMC meeting to discuss the issues and explain why the area is so important and the legal consequences of damage to the features of the site.

Other Access and Conservation News:

Snowdonia Hydro Schemes

There are currently a large number of these schemes which have either been granted planning permission or are going through the planning process at this time within Snowdonia National Park. There are at least four in the Llanberis Pass, a couple in the Ogwen Valley, a proposal for one in the Anafon Valley in the northern Carneddau and numerous others in the Dolgellau and Dinas Mawddwy areas. In the main they are small scale schemes (with weirs no greater than 8 m wide by 1.8 m high at maximum height).

The BMC cannot realistically respond to all of these schemes – and any representation or objections have to be based on proven planning and material considerations to have any influence. To date the BMC has formally responded (contrary to comments on some websites) to a number of these developments and had in-depth discussions with the National Park planning officers and other organisations on the possible impact of these developments.

We have to be pragmatic that as an organisation the BMC is only one voice and its influence is limited and to face the reality that current government policy at both UK and Welsh level is to encourage such developments and that even within a National Park, the planners have to follow national guidance and allow these developments to happen. As an organisation the BMC has managed to positively influence the design and landscaping of some of these developments but that outright objections based solely on subjective opinion will not carry any weight if members wish to object to such developments.

To assist and guide BMC members on how the BMC can support campaigns and objections to any development that members feel has a negative impact on cherished landscapes, the BMC created a working group of members, specialist volunteers and landscape experts to produce the BMC Landscape Charter which should be first port of call for advice on such issues.

Welsh Access Update

The Welsh Government announced in 2013 that they wanted to review all legislation affecting countryside access in Wales, with a view to improving and increasing access for recreation to the Welsh coast, countryside and inland water. The BMC fully supported this move and have been eagerly awaiting the publication of the government's "Green Paper" which would outline the government's proposals regarding new laws in this area. In late Feb the BMC met with the Welsh Minister for Culture and Sports at South Stack to look at the issues and discuss the proposed changes. The BMC also launched its "Open Wales" campaign and to date has had nearly 25,000 visits, nearly 5000 "likes" and over 200 comments on the BMC websites as well has hundreds of shares and likes on Facebook and Twitter. The latest news is not entirely positive as there has been considerable opposition to some of the proposals, especially from anglers and land owners regarding the issue of access to inland waters and rivers. The BMC, while recognising the lack of secure access to water is a massive issue for colleagues in the kayaking world and as also is the limited legal access for mountain bikers to open country, has concentrated its efforts on securing access to inland outcrops and seacliffs. The Sports Minister has considerable understanding and support for the BMC's "asks" and it's likely that the next step will be a BMC organised event at the Welsh Assembly to celebrate and lobby other politicians of the value and need for better access to the Welsh coast and countryside.

Tremfest

This will be on the weekend of May 17/18th and will again be ably (heroically?) organised by Jim and Julia Kelly. Thanks again go to the host, Eric Jones who as always gives the BMC and climbers a great welcome and tremendous support at Tremadog. Lots of things going on and this is your opportunity to actually put something back to climbing in a positive way and help look after one of the UK's most important trad climbing crags, which owned by the BMC on behalf of all climbers.

Other News

Welsh Climbing update

This winter has been marred by awful weather and little in the way of consistent cold spells in Wales. As a result it may come as no surprise that virtually no winter climbing has been done in Snowdonia this season and little in the way of rock climbing either.

As the optimists always say though, there is always dry rock in Wales for those who look for it as Pete Robins and Benno Wagner have proven.

Firstly Pete Robins has laid siege to many well known projects over on the Llŷn Peninsula succeeding in making the first ascent of the incredible arête "The Big Orange" at a highball 8A. Following the first ascent of this impressive line Pete then attempted the oft tried highball wall below Rhiw. This excellent and thin addition goes at 7C+/8A and has been called "Bytilith Wall". Apparently a new area has also been developed along the coast from Porth Ysgo but details are currently being kept quiet whilst the remaining lines are being mopped up...

Pete then turned his attention to the Little Orme where he made the first ascent of a great new sport route on the little ventured Allotment called "The Runner Bean" 8a+ which lies next to Chris Doyle's new addition "Sweetcorn Man", a 7b+. Pete also climbed direct through the main roof at Upper Craig y Don to produce a 'funky' new 8b which remains as yet unnamed.

North Wales Bolt Fund Upper Pen Trwyn - Appeal for Inspectors

The NWBF benefits from money from the BMC by carrying out the inspections of the Upper Pen Trwyn belays - this work is crucial to maintaining access to climbers on these very significant and popular crags. Over the last 6 years BMC money this has paid for several quality battery drills including 2 Dewalt 36volt machines each costing over £500, but worth it as they can drill 30 - 40

holes per charge. It has also allowed the fund to bulk buy bolts, resin and other essentials enabling new routers to have access to cheap bolts and gear.

We need to keep a rolling program in force completing a third of the 200 belays each year - inspections are simple and require very little time but they do need specialist equipment and some basic training on the procedure and the reporting requirements. We need to get more volunteers trained up and willing to help - we can't rely on the old dogs doing it for ever and we don't want to lose the income stream.

North Wales Climbing is in **desperate** need of new blood to help out with these inspections.
