NT land usage, latest

The access team are having a teleconference on Wednesday 8th June with the national project manager from the Trust to get an update – we'll be putting another article out after that to let people know what is going on.

The Lakes as an area have confirmed that they won't be implementing the scheme for instructed groups — they intend to use it for large scale groups and events and are setting the student/participant level at 25 before a licence needs to be applied for. This isn't the case in all areas, but we are talking to several other key climbing/walking areas and they don't seem keen to implement the scheme for small instructed groups either. It seems like something driven by head office at this stage and generally not too popular with teams on the ground, but it's worth remembering that it is a pilot scheme so could change significantly in its final version.
