Pembroke 2013 Nesting Restrictions

North Pembs. – no changes from 2012. All the quality crags are open for climbing (just the loose chossy spots like Llechdafad, Ynys Deullyn and Dinas Fach are restricted) – just beware of seals July-Dec. and avoid disturbance/go to another crag if they are there – this affects Rainbow Zawn area, Craig Llong and a few other crags on the North Coast.

Range West – we now have year round access (previous year's briefings expire in April though), Iron Age Fort is now open for climbing except Hobby Horse Bay side (west of 'Wild Rumpus'). Linney Head Gully restriction has been removed

(Briefing dates for 2013 are: 29th March, 25th May and 27th July.)

Range East – Devil's Barn restriction has gone. Stackpole and Lydstep – no changes although the red pots at Mowing Word are to be removed and an on-site sign about nesting chough will be placed above Deep Space/Stargate at Mother Carey's.

Firing Dates etc - The dates for the next 'CALFEX' (Combined Arms Live Fire Exercise) etc: No Firing = 15th Dec - 13th Jan 2013; CALFEX = 14th Jan - 8th Feb; April Maintenance Period = 6th - 21st April (no firing), Sheep Off weekend = 4th, 5th and 6th May; No Firing = 8th - 16th June; CALFEX = 17th June - 2nd Aug; No Firing = 3rd - 31st Aug.

Range East (St Govan's Chapel to Stack Rocks) and Range West will remain closed from each Monday morning to Friday afternoons throughout CALFEX.


Mountain Heritage Trust
